of America Head Start program on Irving Street. She was thrilled. It was close to home, a bilingual education, and offered more than pre-school for her children. Head Start also offered cooking classes, parenting classes and community involvement. This was a way for not only her children to learn, but for Jane and her husband to learn as well.

"I can't say enough about it," she said. Jane is reserved, but she lights up when she talks about Head Start. "It is amazing to have this opportunity for my children and my family. My oldest son loved school. It was so perfect for him to develop his social skills and I had the support for the teachers."

Jane's oldest son is a typical older brother; he liked to tease his younger brother. But when he entered Head Start, he learned that teasing other children is not appropriate in school. With the help of a behavioral specialist at Head Start, Jane learned ways to teach her son how to play with others and what to do when he got frustrated.

"I'm so thankful that I had that resource," she said. "I needed someone to tell me ways to look outside the box and ways to help my kids learn and be well-rounded."

Behavior ideas weren't the only thing Jane learned; she learned new ways to get her children to eat vegetables, ideas for outside activity and ways to keep her children occupied on a snow day when they can't play outside.

And her son learned too. At Head Start, he developed his English. Both Jane and her husband speak Spanish at home and when their son started to mix Spanish and English, Jane thought it was a step in the right direction.

"I think it's important to teach my children their culture, so yes, Spanish is what we speak at home. But they need to know English just as well. Head Start helped my son be more comfortable with his English. It helped him be more comfortable at home, and he tells me sometimes he needs to eat his vegetables because it's good for him. He just blossomed."

Jane's oldest son is now in Kindergarten, and her youngest started Head Start this year.

According to Jane, "this [Head Start] is such a valuable resource. For my children, for me, for my family. It has been wonderful."

What is the value of an high quality early childhood education, such as the Volunteers of America Head Start Program?

James Heckman, Nobel Memorial Prize Winner in Economics and Colorado Native, shares his thoughts:

"The logic is quite clear from an economic standpoint. We can invest early to close disparities and prevent achievement gaps. Or we can pay to remediate disparities when they are harder and more expensive to close. Either way we are going to pay.

Investing early allows us to shape the future; investing later chains us to fixing the missed opportunities of the past."

VOA Head Start currently supports 85 students, ages 3 to 4.

- 5% of the students we serve are special needs children.
- 50% of students come from single parent homes.
- The parents of 58% of our students did not graduate high school. 81% of parents are non-English speaking.


